A cocoa cooperative received 2,000 kg of fresh cocoa beans from certified producers in total this year and sold 1,500 kg of certified dry cocoa bear buyer. There was no stock from the previous year.

The conversion factor of fresh cocoa beans to dry a beans is 0.35-0.45.

Does this cooperative with the requirement 2.1.9?





Answer: No



A cocoa factory received 2,000 kg of dry cocoa beans and sold 1,600 kg of cocoa liquor to a chocolate manufacturer. There was no remaining stock from the previous year.

The conversion rate of dry cocoa beans to cocoa liquor is 1:0.82 according to Annex S 6.
